Each season, we seek new ways of telling stories that the world needs to hear, and that challenge us to confront urgent issues in our own time. We strive to present these stories in the voices of people who have lived them. We want our performances to make you think, to make you feel, and to bring you along on transformative journeys.

From Music of Remembrance's beginnings in 1998, we've experienced our own transformative journey. Our repertoire and scope have expanded each season with a growing focus on compelling issues for today. While maintaining our Seattle roots, we also bring live performances to San Francisco, Chicago and beyond, and we reach a diverse and growing audience around the world with our streamed programs and cinema-quality video productions. Anticipating the demands that future growth will place on a small organization like ours, we recently took the important step of hiring our first executive director, Lorri Staal, who has already had a strong positive impact.

Our 2024/25 season continues to break new ground. Its highlights include a young Afghani-born composer's eloquent plea for peace in his native land, and a program showcasing works by three prominent Black American composers, tracing an arc from the time of slavery to the Jim Crow era to the present day. There's also the world premiere of a work we've commissioned about the Crypto-Jews forced by the

inquisition to conceal their identity. And we'll unveil a new production of Tom Cipullo's award-winning opera After Life, imagining a confrontation between the ghosts of Pablo Picasso and Gertrude Stein over the responsibility of artists and the meaning of art itself in a troubled world.

The world has changed, sometimes at a dizzying pace, and MOR has changed along with it by addressing issues of human rights in our own time. Our programs bear witness to the power of love, courage and memory. At a time when hope is so needed, MOR can offer works of beauty and meaning, music that can inspire visions in all of us for a better world. Honoring the creative traditions of Indigenous artists

OUR SEASON-OPENING CONCERT, Between Worlds, featured the world premiere of the MOR commission Raven and the Box of Daylight. The engrossing multisensory work combined

Native American storytelling, dance and musical traditions, enhanced by filmed sculpture by renowned Tlingit glass artist Preston Singletary. The Raven legend has been passed down for centuries among indigenous peoples in the Pacific Northwest. It relates the story of Raven and his transformation of the world bringing light to people by means of

the stars, moon, and sun. We are indebted to Barbara Daniels for her generous sponsorship of this work.

At the same concert, we performed the evocative string quartet Pisachi by Chickasaw composer Jerod Impichchaachaaha' Tate. The work's title is the Chickasaw word for reveal, and the music is infused with Pueblo and Hopi styles. Tate is rare as a composer who channels American Indian history and culture through a classical medium.

Confronting challenges in today's world

PHOENIX, ANOTHER MOR COMMISSION and world premiere, is composer Sahba Aminikia and librettist Zara Houshmand's

compelling musical statement about the current women's rights struggle in Iran. The voices of three generations of Iranian women share the deep

cultural history underlying the current uprising, and the challenges that have demanded their courage. The work had

Another pathbreaking new opera by Jake Heggie and Gene Scheer

Through an aging veteran's odyssey, we're reminded that we are never too old to learn, to change, and to understand the world and ourselves in new ways.

COMPOSER JAKE HEGGIE AND LIBRETTIST GENE SCHEER are widely considered the most important creative team in opera today. Before It All Goes Dark, their fifth commission for MOR, is based on an amazing story that the distinguished music writer Howard Reich reported in the Chicago Tribune about a troubled and aging Vietnam veteran who learned that he was the sole heir to a priceless art collection stolen by the Nazis from a great-great

uncle in Prague whom he'd never even heard of. The opera takes us along on his arduous journey to Prague and beyond in search of this inheritance. We're with him on a voyage of self-discovery as he absorbs the transformative power of art itself, and as he finds identity in the Jewish heritage that had been hidden from him.

We premiered this powerful work to rapt audiences on a

three-city tour to Seattle, San Francisco and Chicago, with a stellar vocal cast of opera stars Ryan McKinny and Megan Marino.

In many ways, Before It All Goes Dark encapsulates what Music of Remembrance is about. We speak of the power of music to make a difference in the world, and about how art can be a catalyst for change. The opera's true story is an inspiration for all of us.

Jake Heggie Named Musical America's Composer of the Year for 2025



JAKE HEGGIE WAS RECENTLY NAMED Musical America's Composer of the Year for 2025. And in March 2025 he'll be inducted into the Opera Hall of Fame.

Jake has enriched Music of Remembrance in so many ways with his creative brilliance and loyal friendship over a span of almost two decades. Beginning in 2007 with For a Look or a Touch, the first opera ever about the Nazi persecution of gay people, Jake and librettist Gene Scheer have brought us five pathbreaking new works that have gone on to touch the hearts of people around the world.

In his life and his music, Jake embodies a passionate commitment to the best of humanity. We're profoundly grateful and offer our heartfelt congratulations to Jake for these deeply deserved honors.

Making a difference across the community, the country and the world

WHEN WE TELL STORIES that need to be told, we want the music and the message to reach people everywhere—not just those able to attend the performance in person. While continuing to build a worldwide presence, our essential ties to the Seattle community are at our core. We continue to present our



annual free-tothe-community Art From Ashes concert every January, and it was a special honor in 2024 when Music of Remembrance was presented

with the Metropolitan King County Council's Proclamation of International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

The pandemic taught us the importance of reaching out with streamed programming, and we have continually expanded that effort. We regularly present these free streamed performances to mark meaningful occasions. Recently we streamed Shinji Eshima's haunting August 6^{th} to remember the nuclear bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. For National Native American Heritage Month, we offered a video of the multisensory Raven and the Box of Daylight from our October 2023 concert. For Armenian Genocide Remembrance Day, we streamed Eric Hachikian's Return to Amasia, the composer's musical and visual account of his journey to his ancestral homeland. People everywhere could view our performance of Mary Kouyoumdjian's to open myself, to scream, a searing portrayal of the fate of the Roma in Nazi Europe. To honor Holocaust

Remembrance Day, we streamed In Sleep The World Is Yours, composer Lori Laitman's setting of poignant poems of a gifted young writer who died in a slave labor camp but never lost her capacity for love and hope. In a tribute to an emerging generation of artists, we streamed the stunning performance of Leyna Kitahama, the 2021 recipient of our David Tonkonogui Memorial Award, as solo cellist in Gerard Schwarz's In Memoriam.

To date we've issued nine audio CDs (eight on the Naxos label), three DVDs of operas we've commissioned, and two documentary films about our work and mission. We now produce cinema-quality video recordings of all our major commissions, helping advance the prospects that they'll find

a life of their own. Recently, we partnered with San Diego Symphony to present Nicolas Benavides' opera Tres minutos, about a family and the border

separating them. And our video of our 2024 premiere of Jake Heggie and Gene Scheer's Before It All Goes Dark will soon be released by EuroArts for worldwide digital distribution.

Earlier recipients of the award have proceeded to make a difference in highprofile musical careers, joining orchestras like the Boston Symphony and the New York Philharmonic. DANCE HAS A SPECIAL WAY of bringing stories to life, and MOR's recent season included commissions from two of today's most gifted choreographers, both inspired by music from the film screen. Spectrum Dance Theater's Donald Byrd created a new dance suite set to music from Betty Olivero's evocative klezmer-infused score for the classic 1920 silent film The Golem, animating a medieval Jewish legend about survival and its costs that has renewed relevance for today. And

we brought back Whim W'Him Seattle Contemporary Dance Theater with the dances that Olivier Wevers choreographed for us in 2017 to Lullaby and Doina from composer Osvaldo Golijov's film score for The Man Who Cried. depicting the intertwined fates

Testimonies for Tomorrow

WE CONTINUE TO LEAD THE WAY with our unique commissioning program that has brought nearly fifty important new works into the world. In recent seasons we have commissioned and premiered compelling new works on Native American experience, the wartime incarceration of Japanese Americans, the Armenian genocide, the worldwide refugee crisis, the persecution of gay people, the threat of nuclear destruction, the consequences of religious prejudice of all kinds, the heartbreak of families separated by borders, and many other issues for our time. With works like these, we remind one another that beyond the headlines and policy debates, there are people with real lives, complicated relationships and urgent needs.

Our recent season unveiled three impactful new works: Raven and the Box of Daylight, Phoenix, and Before It All Goes Dark.

The 2024/25 season brings the premiere of award-winning Portuguese composer Luis Tinoco's Tribulations, about the Crypto-Jews forced by the Inquisition to conceal their identity. And there's new choreography that we've commissioned from Spectrum Dance Theater's Donald Byrd for composer Jessie Montgomery's Source Code, drawing on motifs from Black American spirituals. The season concludes with an expanded new version of After Life, Tom Cipullo and librettist David Mason's provocative opera imagining a confrontation between the ghosts of Pablo Picasso and Gertrude Stein over the role of artists, and the meaning of art itself, in a troubled world.

Bringing a new work into the world is a gestation that typically takes at least two years from conception to creation, and finally to performance. Already we're preparing a new opera, *The Dialogue of Memories*, that Tom

Cipullo and writer Howard Reich are developing for our 2025/26 season. You'll soon be hearing more about the work. It exemplifies the kind of long-term planning required

by a project like this. Commissioning and presenting a major new work is also an expensive undertaking, easily costing \$50,000 or more. We couldn't do it without the support of our generous donors.
